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it's a good amendment. It corrects an unjust situation. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Let me just give you another little illustration. If I have my fliers, or any other grocer...I am one of 700 to 800 retail outlets that are supplied by this warehouse in Norfolk, Nebraska, and now out of a city in Kansas also. They've been a very successful company, very successful. They started out with, in the late or early forties, with maybe fifteen or twenty stores and now they have seven to eight hundred, seven to eight hundred outlets throughout the Midwest. But if I have my advertising specials put on the truck that comes out of Norfolk or Kansas and they bring them to my store and I run them through my postage machine or sit there and put a three-cent, five-cent, whatever the amount of postage is on that particular printed material, then I don't pay sales tax on that postage or I don't pay sales tax on that amount of postage. I still pay the sales tax on the printed material. I'm not denying that. That needs to be paid. But the postage is what's wrong. If I do it, run it through my machine, it's not taxed. If Affiliated Foods runs it through their postage machine then I pay sales tax on that postage. No, I don't have a high-powered lobbyist lobbying for me. I'm doing it myself. But I have around 800 retailers that are certainly affected by this. And why are other states seeing the light on this and throwing it out? South Dakota did when Arkansas, the court in Arkansas, said, no, you can't do that, you can't charge sales tax on postage, period. You can charge sales tax on the printed material, that's fine, but not that postage. And I'm not aware of any state in the United States that does what we're doing here in Nebraska. And I'll guarantee you if they lose this in the Court of Appeals you can bet that they are going to be moving a bunch of printing machinery to the warehouse in Kansas. I'll get the same service. I'll get my fliers. They'll be coming out of Kansas. And those people that work in that print shop and that warehouse will be paying Kansas income tax, Kansas sales tax. They'll be helping support the state of Kansas. You say Affiliated has hundreds of employees, certainly they do. But they'll lose 25, 30 people out of Senator Tyson's district. How many more, how many more companies are going to
