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move out of Nebraska? Affiliated Foods, they took advantage of LB 775. It's great for them.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: But when you come down to a small thing, I don't think it's right. I just don't think it's right, and that's why we are discussing that here today. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Chambers, on the Janssen amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I think Senator Landis laid out the proper rationale and, as much as I would like to support Senator Janssen, I'm not going to support this amendment. There are any number of reasons that somebody could support a constituent or in this case himself or herself. Senator Janssen is more direct than I've ever heard anybody on the floor in saying I'm doing this for me. (Laugh) Let me ask Senator Janssen a question now that I think of it.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, did you file a conflict of interest on this issue? I'm just curious.

SENATOR JANSSEN: No, I didn't, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you. (Laugh)

SENATOR JANSSEN: And I don't grow corn either, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) That's okay. That's all. I was just curious based on what you said the last time. Members of the Legislature, the tax system in Nebraska might look like a piece of Swiss cheese at this point based on the exemptions already there. But they get there in the way that we are proceeding here this afternoon or being asked to proceed. And when you look at the totality of what has happened, very few of us would
