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sales tax. I mean, is that...would that be an accurate assumption?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: I would draw the same conclusion.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, thank you, Senator. Well, I'll get back to those questions. I don't want to take any more time on Senator Janssen's amendment. But I think the case is looking shakier all the time. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Chambers, on the Janssen amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I need to ask Senator Janssen a question so that I can get an understanding of what this is.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen, would you yield?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Certainly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, I'm looking at your sheet and in view of what Senator Tyson I believe had said about some business moving out of Nebraska, now on the right-hand side where it says "sales tax on postage",...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...exactly who is the customer that is identified here? Would you, as the grocer, be the customer?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if you have to pay the sales tax, why is the printer going to move out of Nebraska? What I was hearing Senator Tyson said is that, and you did too, that the print shop is going to move to Kansas because you have...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to pay sales tax on the postage.
