you to move your operation to Kansas and hire Kansas people to do this just so you don't have to pay tax on postage?

SENATOR JANSSEN: It amounts to quite a bit of money, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, isn't it true that the grocery business has probably of most businesses the smallest amount of profit overall?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if the profit margin is that small, you're telling me that it would...you would gain by moving this whole operation to Kansas.

SENATOR JANSSEN: The print shop, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The print shop. What taxes would your print shop have to pay in Kansas, if you know?

SENATOR JANSSEN: You would pay tax on the printed material.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What is the rate of their tax? What's the percentage?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, whatever the rate is in Kansas or in Nebraska, you would still pay that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Suppose the tax rate on these things that you will pay tax on, the rate is higher in Kansas than it is here. Had you considered that before you'd make such a move?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No. I don't think it is, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you would consider that, wouldn't you?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Oh, sure, certainly. Certainly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if the tax rate were higher in Kansas on what you have to pay taxes on, then it might be feasible to stay in Nebraska anyway even with this tax.
