federal mandate may be cause for some kind of federal refund or federal regress, but it's certainly no reason why the state should be getting into the business of refunds especially in a situation where, as has been described to you on General File debate, with the acquisition of the additional bands that may well be that in the future the competitive advantage of the digital situation may be greatly to their advantage, not at all a detriment except perhaps in the very short term. So I think I will put this amendment out here and those of you who think maybe a compromise on this is better than all or nothing and serves us better as a Legislature I would like to hear from you and see what you think. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Preister, your light was on from the last amendment. Did you wish to speak to this amendment also?

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President. Yes, I will take this opportunity. I did have my light on awhile back. I wanted to check because I'm considering an amendment but I thought I might test the waters before I actually introduced the amendment. I know there are at least four Omaha senators that would like the concept of what I want to do, but I'm particularly interested in what Senator Landis might think. I would like to propose an amendment that would exempt everyone living east of 72nd Street in a metropolitan class city from paying any sales tax. And my rationale for doing that is because all of these good folks are already having to pay excessive fees or taxation, as you will, on their insurance premiums and so this would just be offsetting. And so I think it's only fair to those folks that they have a break somewhere where they're not getting a break in other areas. And, Senator Landis, since you're so involved with that cold-hearted Revenue Committee, I'm trying to make a case to you especially because I know you're just so generous on that other committee that you happen to chair and you would certainly be in favor of helping those poor folks not getting insurance. Anyway, my amendment probably wouldn't fly any better than the attempts at getting some relief on insurance, but I would welcome any comments on giving a break to those folks that are overcharged on their auto liability insurance. And, Senator Landis, if you would care to comment, I would certainly yield you some time to do that.
