SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...conflict is not created by what I say. The conflict was in them from the beginning because they do have at least a modicum of principle. It's just my words that brought out in the open what they had done. And they knew what they had done. My words don't convict them. Their conscience is what does the job. That's why preachers spend all that time trying to appeal to something in people, why Abraham Lincoln talked about the angels of your higher nature. Maybe there are no angels and maybe no higher nature, but if there's anybody out there with something in them like that then I want to reach out there and touch it. And maybe, if I touch it in that person, that person has a greater ability to reach other people than I do. But I have to make the effort. And maybe there is nothing in this Chamber except the stony ground, the seeds you plant and the things sprout up quick because they don't have any root, but they just as quickly die.
