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the Appropriations Committee? Is it merely a resolution, or would it take actually a legislative act? And I think the intent is that it would take a legislative act to continue. We've seen that, we've had a lot of sunsets, and we've had a lot of bills that have modified or extended sunsets. That's what it would take, it would take an actual bill to do so. So I think the...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR MATZKE: ...language is ambiguous, and I support Senator Beutler's amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Matzke. (Visitors introduced.) Further debate on the Beutler amendment to the committee amendments to LB 936, Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. As the last time we talked about LB 936 on General File, this issue, Senator Beutler's amendment was included in an amendment was a little broader in scope. At that time, he indicated on the floor that other than being a repetition of the language that is included in the Quality Jobs Act, it really didn't add anything to the bill and I find nothing since that time that would indicate that Senator Beutler is not right and that we should, in fact, adopt the Beutler amendment to LB 936 and strike the extraneous language. On the broader scale, though, I think that Senator Chambers has indicated something that's worthy of discussion, not necessarily in the context of being bad in LB 936, but something that we ought to think about on a broader scale of economic development incentive packages. While it is true, and he is accurate, there are many, many minimum wage jobs in Douglas County, Nebraska. The average wage in Douglas County, Nebraska may well be \$15 an hour as the Department of Labor indicates. But when you think about encouraging business development, perhaps 125 percent of the average minimum wage in order to qualify is something we might want to consider at another time and another place on other economic development incentive packages because it does raise a very, very valid point. Something that has always bothered me about many of the things that we have done here, while they encouraged certainly employment, and I think our unemployment
