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paid in cities, I think they will take the opportunity to try to create "telework" in these communities. Now, I had a person in my office this morning who operates a company like that. And I asked him to come in and tell me and explain to me what kind of investment that normally takes. The investment that they normally would need to make would be much less than the minimum threshold capital investment in this bill. So my suggestion is that, between now and Select File, we try to tailor this bill, targeting it in some respects, in one section of the bill, to take advantage of "telework" and telemarketing opportunities that I think could be created in these rural communities. Distance is not a problem with the Internet, location is not a problem with the Internet. People want to live in these communities, want to raise their families there; all they want is a decent job and they'll stay there, or I think their kids will return there because of the lifestyle, because of the security they feel in raising their families there. And so I support the bill. I think the bill is an excellent idea. When we look at what we did with LB 775 and the larger investments that were created, the Cargill's and those companies that took advantage of LB 775, very positive. This will be an opportunity to tailor...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...that kind of economic development incentive to the rural communities. But the bill needs a little work yet. I think the Governor would even admit that the bill could probably be improved. And so I'm interested in doing that, but I encourage the body to continue to support the bill. I support the Beutler amendment and I'd like to see us work on it, to make it an even better bill. Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Further debate on the Beutler amendment? Senator Engel.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the body, I, too, support the Beutler amendment because I do believe in the...with what it proposes as far as time limits on our legislation, or sunseting. I also support the bill. About four or five years ago I was sponsoring LB 425, which they called it selective enhancement for economic development bill,
