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would call destination retail. Along Interstate 80 by Sidney, there is wonderful Cabela's that I know a lot of people, that's either their destination or a must stop along the way and, fortunately, they leave some dollars there. I know that the outlet mall along Interstate 80 west of Omaha is another example. And to have this exception I think may be well intended against the big superstores--Wal-Mart, Kmart and otherwise--but I think we're also losing out on something that's very important and we would lose out on some of the effects, the positive effects, of the sales tax. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Smith. We are debating the Chambers amendment to the committee amendments to LB 936. Senator Coordsen, followed by Senator Chambers, then Senator Matzke. Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I'm excited about this bill. I was excited about enterprise zones. Remember enterprise zones, Senator? I think the senator is reading. But you remember enterprise zones of several years ago, the only other economic development project we had that I was ever excited about to the extent that I'm excited about this, and that was one we appropriated money for and that didn't work very well, to the best of my knowledge. If it is...if it did work, I would stand to be corrected. We've tried lots of stuff. One of the reasons, at least my reason, for supporting the committee amendment with the prohibition against retail sales, that to the greatest extent retail sales circulate money within a community and the reason there isn't much for retail sales in most communities, other than hub communities in outstate Nebraska, is in fact that there's not much money to circulate. I would cite for you an example of the Pioneer's Inn in Gilead, Nebraska, several years ago had a problem with their well, which was located in the basement of the cafe, and they were going to have to close, and the people in the community, a hat was set out and they contributed the money necessary, because certainly the owners of that cafe did not have the dollar volume. They were going to have to close because they could not afford the money that it took to hook up to a rural water system in order to have water that was chlorinated and "fluorided" and whatever else you folks do to city water, and we raised the money locally to do that. Those
