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sorts of things I believe are intercommunity activities that will, in fact, happen. Other folks or someone else at least indicated on the floor that with money they too will come, and that will happen with restaurants, with food service, whether that's a retail grocery or whatever that is, if there's money in the community and the number of people that it takes to support a retail business. Simply to "incent" a retail business is not going to guarantee any sort of community type of activity. I would cite for you a personal example of a friend of mine who had two sons. One went into farming and the other one went to Milford and became a skilled craftsman in metalworking. And when the son graduated from Milford they came back to...to their home locality and rented an abandoned building where another business had went bankrupt and bought some used or military surplus or some sort of metalworking equipment and developed a trade...developed a clientele, primarily in an area of heavy industrial manufacturing in another state. And things progressed along fairly rapidly and they were able, after the...after the highway was...in that area was converted into a four-lane system, were able to move over to that highway and build a new building. But the interesting thing about that, and they employ a number of people, I don't know how many they employ, but they were able to receive I think no help. And one of the primary things according to the father, the farmer,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...was that they were paying too high of wages for the community. It was one of the nuttiest things I'd ever ran across. And that's one of the reasons that I'm excited, to the extent that I ever get excited, about LB 936, because it is, in such a way...formed in such a way, that it "incent" investment in the most distressed areas in ways that we've never tried before. Maybe it will not work. I don't know. I would think that if I were to find fault with LB 936, and other members of the Legislature and I have talked about this, the fact of the matter, I believe, is that the dollar investment per employee for a beginning business is way, way too high. To have three employees plus yourself and \$300,000, well, I'll tell you, perhaps in Omaha \$300,000 is not a lot of money,...
