of those 16 bills. Bills that ought to be discussed individually should be discussed. We haven't even had what I had asked of Senator Jensen on these four--a discussion of the four bills that are going to be the committee amendment. That's what I had asked for. I said we're not going to have these twelve, but I'm hoping that we'll get a discussion of the four. Who knows what is in those four bills? I'm going to be accommodating and let this thing move, but I'm going to insist on a discussion of each one of those bills and the way I'm going to get it is to make a motion to strike each one from the bill. The least we should have gotten was a discussion of those bills, and we didn't. And you all don't require it, but you all are very happy when I will stand up here and be the lightning rod and insist that we operate in an orderly deliberative manner. And you know why I know you appreciate it? Because when those things are brought to a slower pace people join in the discussion. They do have questions. They may even offer amendments. I don't have a committee chairmanship, I don't have a vice-chairman...I don't want them, but I don't have any of those formal positions. This that I do is not my job. I do it as an extension of grace, and I will continue to do so. But I want others to know that this is not the only bill that I'm going to react to in this manner. When Senator Wesely was in this Chamber, he sat next to me...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and I was able to look at his lists and tell him, Don, that's not going to go. He'd say, gee, Ernie, you know this is...I say, yeah, I can agree with it but it's not going to go and if you try to put it on I'm going to try to stop the bill. Ask him if you don't think I'm telling you the truth. So I want you all to be aware of what we're going to deal with and I want the people in the lobby to be aware also, and if everybody else is going to sit quiet, I'm going to make noise whenever I think I ought to make it. But I'm going to pick and choose when I make noise. I'm going to define "Christmas tree" as I choose and if you give me that prerogative then it's your fault. It's what you grant to me. Thank you, Mr. President.
