PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Schmitt. Senator Matzke.

SENATOR MATZKE: Thank you, Mr. President. I want to comment to Senator Chambers' amendment in two ways. First, Senator Chambers, when I read this I understood pens to include, like, feedlots or corrals as a way of defining what a livestock operation is. Now that's how I read it, but in view of the discussion that has been here and your comments, I think you're absolutely right that this raises an issue of confusion as to terminology because it doesn't say feedlot or corrals. I mean I don't really quite know what pens are. Pens are usually small pens and corrals and feedlots are usually large enclosures. And I think you're absolutely right, when we're dealing with a statute let's make sure we know what it means before we pass it. So I support your amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Matzke. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are there any other lights on? Then I will turn mine off and save mine for the close.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Jones.

SENATOR JONES: Mr. President and members of the body, everybody is confused about pens. Now out my way they call pens may be it's just a place where they're "backgrounding" cattle, and I do that on my own ranch, and then I plow it up and plant cane or hybrid Sudan grass in the summertime in it, but I still call it a pen. So if they're confused about what a pen is, well, it could be different sizes, I can see that now from the description here. So I think this is something that we do need to correct in the language here. Thank you.
