going to behave in a responsible fashion, our actions should withstand critical scrutiny and logical analysis. There is nothing logical in passing a bill such as this when we've already acted on LB 1348. Then the Legislature has acted on LB 936, which is a total waste but nevertheless the Legislature acted on that bill. Why this one? Senator Vrtiska discussed what the bill does, but he did not give a justification for our acting on it in view of what we've already done. What Senator Vrtiska ought to do, if I...if he was going to follow my advice, which he probably won't, is add his name to LB 1348 and then, whatever is of significance in this bill, amend it onto LB 1438 (sic). But to take the time that I'm prepared to take on it, and my aim being to kill it, should be and could be better spent. I'm glad that the Speaker handed around his notice to us, pointing out how few days that we have left, and I'm glad that he has threatened you all with being kept here at least until eight o'clock. Now that's no threat to me. I have one of those kind of engines something like in a race car. It's got to really get warmed up and revved and get hot and then it will just go, go, go.
