

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE  
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SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, they would.

SENATOR RAIKES: An outside person, a taxpayer or a community person would receive information on writing, the one through four number for each...

SENATOR BOHLKE: By building.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...for each building. They wouldn't have access...

SENATOR BOHLKE: Not by individual.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...to my individual score, for each building. And then we'd have, well, let me ask you this. Would there be a way to rank buildings or districts or systems statewide using this mechanism?

SENATOR BOHLKE: If you wanted to,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...you would be able to see, there would be information that you would be able to see building, it's going to be reported to the department by district. But it would be public information at that point. If you wanted to go to the work and see how every building in Lincoln did compared to how every building in Benkelman did or Hastings did, you could do that. But that would be a matter of public record in that...

SENATOR RAIKES: But wouldn't that be the real reason to have the same writing test statewide? I mean this is sort of a departure of philosophy here. I mean most of the test the philosophy is individual or school-based testing. This one part, writing, is statewide. Everything is the same statewide. Is the idea behind that to provide this ranking throughout the state?

SENATOR BOHLKE: I don't...I do not believe anyone is going to go and go building over by building...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.
