SENATOR WICKERSHAM: It isn't.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...it does seem like to me...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: It's not related at all.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: But...well, except it gets into TERC a little bit.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes. But it is no different than any procedure that we would have in any other administrative agency, from that standpoint.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Well, I'll let you look at your e-mail. I...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Okay.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...if there's more to say on this later, like next week, I would appreciate hearing more because...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Sure.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...this letter is sent to all of us and...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Okay.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senators, I realize it's the noonhour, but please try to hold your conversations down so we can all...all hear. Thank you very much. Senator Kristensen, on the Wickersham amendment to LB 968.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Senator Wehrbein, I agree with Senator Wickersham. If I was going to do that case that's the exact things I would use. The county does have the ability to go in and ask for some protective order if they think that it's a fishing expedition and they're asking for volumes of records, but when they specify
