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remain where they are in the State Office Building, along in the same place that they are, or are they going to take new office space, or what? I'm just curious as to how the arrangement is going to be, because now they're working through...in the HHS office, over there. Where are these offices going to be at and what's the connection between? So, if you could answer that.

SENATOR CROSBY: They're...and when I said that they are going to remain where they are, they are at 4600 Valley Road in Lincoln, and that building, I think is that where the Hearing Impaired, and the Hearing Impaired Agency, they are...they won't move from that place. They are not looking for new space.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay, so they're really not in the...I...I wasn't even sure where their offices were located.

SENATOR CROSBY: Well, yeah, when we talk about HHS, I mean, HHS is all over the place, let me tell you.

SENATOR VRTISKA: (Laughter) I understand that. Well, I just wanted to get those things clear in my mind. And I appreciate your taking the time to answer. And with that, I turn the rest of my time back to the Chair. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Dwite Pedersen, followed by Senators Lynch, Chambers, Stuhr and Jensen.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. Members of the Legislature, I stand in strong support of LB 352. I've been a cosigner of this bill every time that Senator Crosby has introduced it and see that it is legislation beyond its...that has needed to be done for some time. Just because the blind and seeing impaired people cannot see does not mean they can't have a vision. They've seen what they wanted and needed for some time. And especially with what Senator Lynch had said, I applaud him; couldn't have been said better. Senator Crosby has worked hard in this effort, and it's something that needs to be done without putting it on beyond another year. Please support it. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Lynch. Senator Chambers.
