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sometimes they might have to hold off this year. And then, in doing what is wise or proper for a fiduciary, fiduciary, they will try to make it up later. And if the market is never favorable for selling this land then...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...they won't sell it, because there is that escape clause. They don't have to sell it. And even under Senator Baker's bill that he's offering now, they don't have to sell it. So when you get angry again what are you going to bring us the next time? But, anyway, my amendment is a very gentle, "Bambish", harmless, helpless little amendment that is just trying to struggle and find a home with this bill.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. There are a number of lights on. I'll go through the speakers list to see who wants to be recognized on the Chambers amendment. Senator Dierks.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I have a little history of this legislation myself. I have always been in opposition to the mandatory selling of school land and the reasoning is that I think that our forefathers were wise in setting aside land out there for educational purposes that would take care of us in a rainy day, and we surely may have rainy days and that land is there to provide that income. So I've not been a supporter of selling...mandatory selling of school land. This particular...this particular bill, I probably won't be supporting that. I guess I...I need to know a little bit more about what's going on here. I need to know, for instance, with Senator Chambers' amendment...Senator Chambers, would you respond to a question, please?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR DIERKS: For just an itty-bitty old harmless amendment that's going some place to look for a home, what...what do we change with...by moving "sale purposes" and "purposes of sale" around?
