unchanging nature. I don't see it that way. I do not see that the interests of the state, the children or education have been harmed by the state holding on to this land. Maybe what we ought to do is find the senators and others who are angriest at those...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...board members and let them put on boxing gloves and just have it out till they get tired. Nobody would get hurt, because by the time they get the gloves on and get through shadow boxing, they've probably expended about as much energy as they have, and then they can go on about their business. But to do something like what this bill envisions is as bad as what was attempted by LB 1205 in 1996, and I did vote against that and spoke against it. But I was insistent that we put the proviso about the fiduciary duties and that no part of that selling and that other programmatic activity would be undertaken if it violated the fiduciary duties of the board. But this amendment is inconsequential. I hope you'll adopt it.
