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SENATOR KREMER: Is it required that all of it is disbursed then or just a portion of it or...

SENATOR BAKER: Well, they take their operating budget out of their Cash Funds, which of course is generated from lease rentals.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay. I was thinking, as a businessperson, if you were required to sell something in the next seven years and you could double your investment right now, what would keep you from selling it now and doubling your investment rather than waiting for another seven years?

SENATOR BAKER: Is that a question?

SENATOR KREMER: It seems only logical that you would sell something that you were going to have to sell in the next few years anyway, at least start before the seven years expires on the lease, in order to get a double return on it now than wait for another seven years and lost all that money. So it would be a good investment for our schools then, wouldn't it?

SENATOR BAKER: I would agree, if that's a question. I think we're probably derelict in our duty not bringing this to a...bringing this issue up before now, because obviously if we'd been returning 8 percent return on all of this money, instead of 4 percent, we would have had a lot more state aid to school children.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay, thank you. I...that's all the question I had. I'll return my...balance of my time back to the Chair.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Kremer. Senator Wickersham, you're recognized to close on the committee amendments to LB 1010.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Mr. President, members of the body, I think we've had a fairly full discussion of the issues around the committee amendments. The committee amendments do become the bill.
