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that we can buy up all this land cheap? And you'll have to say, well, I guess they snookered me, I didn't read the bill, I didn't know what was happening; you don't expect me to go down there and understand these bills, do you? I just go down there to vote, and I see how they all vote, and that's the way I vote. And somebody says, well, why you do that? He'll say or she will say, I was reading something that J. Paul Getty had said about his oil fields, and he told about this situation where a reporter from the New York Times was down there to check things out, and all of a sudden workers just came running and J. Paul Getty started running, too, and the reporter stayed there. And then, after all the hubbub was over, the reporter asked him, why did you start running? He said, when people start running down here on an oil field, you don't ask questions, you just run first. Well, that's what my colleagues are going to say: Well, I saw everybody else voting for it, so I voted for it. Well, what did you think you were voting for, the constituent will ask. Well, the senator will reply, I don't have much time to do much thinking down there. And the constituent pauses, scratches his or her head and says, well, what did I send you down there for? The senator rises up and says, well, how much thinking you expect somebody to do for \$12,000 a year? (Laughter) And the constituent says, well, I guess it's true what they say; you don't get any more than you pay for, and sometimes you don't get as much as what you pay for; but for \$12,000 a year, I guess you get pretty poor stuff, so okay. When you running again? Senator says, well, I'm running now. He says, can I be on your campaign committee? And the senator says, yes, and they all live happily ever after. The people don't expect much, they don't get much, and that's the way things are meant to be and they're comfortable. People are trained to accept nothing. They know something is wrong, but they don't know what to do about it, so they would rather be comfortable in the same way that some people stay in abusive relationships. They become accustomed to it. They can be made so fearful that they think any change is going to be for the worse,...
