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wander, we cannot become so distracted or tired that we cease doing our work. If you were on guard duty in the army, you're not supposed to go to sleep at your post. We have a job to do, and I know this is not the kind of bill that anybody would deem exciting, except perhaps (laugh) the "Wizard of Wickersham", maybe Senator Raikes, but I'm not sure. But there were a couple of times during the discussion when I felt a little bit of energy welling up. But I think it should be clear for everybody that, in my opinion, the Legislature is powerless to compel the board to sell one acre, just like the Legislature cannot compel a prosecutor to prosecute. The Legislature cannot compel a judge to reach a specific decision in a specific case, but my colleagues don't care about that. There's something they want to do, and they're going to do it no matter what. Why even the "Silver Fox" is going to keep us around here, stumbling and fumbling for several hours on a bill that he knows is unconstitutional, but he's stubborn, bull-headed, got to have his way (laugh), so I'm going to help him and going to enjoy it mightily because it's a win-win situation for me. I will take my whipping on this bill. As I tell many people, I get kicked around so much down here, my empathies and sympathies are with a soccer ball. I know, I'm probably the only one who knows how a soccer ball feels, the soccer ball and me, me and the soccer ball. So I'm going to take my kicking again this evening, but I want people to understand that this bill is not going to necessarily force that board to do what some of my colleagues seem to think the board does not want to do. They're angry at the board. You hear them talking about administration, they pay people too much money over there. What has that got to do with balancing a portfolio? They just don't like the people over there and what they're doing. So, if you all want to help them get their revenge, which is hollow, proceed. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Baker, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Mr. President. Members, I really do believe this bill is a reasonable, responsible approach to the problem, and we do have a problem. I continually hear fiduciary duty, when we are the fiduciary, this Legislature, the state of Nebraska is the fiduciary, the board is our agent. The problem
