and get worked to death. I've watched the master perfect the bill, hour after hour. So please, please, let's don't stretch it too far that every bill must come from committee in pristine order. The constitutional issue has basically to do with something that we're choosing to ignore in this debate. I appreciate Senator Matzke handing out the Exon v. Board of Regents decision. I'd ask you all to turn to page 5, that's the next one, it doesn't have any highlighting. That's where the Supreme Court couldn't have said it better. "There is no controversy concerning funds which are derived from taxation. The plaintiff concedes that the Legislature has complete control of the money which is to be appropriated to the University from the general revenue of the state. The controversy here", meaning in the Exon case, "concerns funds derived from operation of the University or received from the federal government or private donors." Ergo, therefore that's why you'll see in some amendments that are filed, which we know we're not going to get to, the change that has been made to make the bill constitutional is to take out any reference to anything except state tax dollars, and to take out putting any individual...
