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been certainly a learning experience for me on many levels and on many issues. One of the issues, I think, that is...that is central to this, and I would like to have comment from some opponents of the bill, regarding the concept. If there were indeed alternatives available to using the tissue from elective abortions, would there still be opposition to this bill? Sometimes when you're discussing the bill with a colleague and they say they don't support the bill, they received the volumes of information from the university saying that there are no alternatives, but there might be in the future. What I would like to...is, since we are going to spend at least some time discussing the issue, and I think the debate has been very good, if there is alternatives, would the body support giving direction to the University of Nebraska, which according to Article VII, Section 2, the general government of the University of Nebraska shall, under the direction of the Legislature, give general direction that we're not going to use aborted fetal tissue? It's hard to hit a moving target. And, if you're truly opposed to the bill, you may not want to comment and just keep that target moving and make it difficult. And I'm not sure if it was late January, but there was an article in the World-Herald. one of the regents said the bill's not needed because by July we're going to be using alternatives anyway. That has since changed and I know that, I'm not make...I'm not saying that the university tried to deceive, but that regent had a different idea of where they were going with this. He probably didn't under...didn't know at the time the time frame needed to get the alternatives. I have a...certainly a lot of contact and I have a letter in writing from the Chancellor of the University of Nebraska Medical Center, and I believe him that, we will leave no stone unturned looking for alternatives. I remember, I believe it was Regent Hassebrook, in the Daily Nebraskan. mentioned we need time, we need time. Well, first of all, it's...it's tough to know, you know, I certainly would like to say, well how much time? Can you give me a date? Is it going to be December 3rd, is it going to be January 1st of next year, is it going to be, you know, June 1? And I know that that's difficult because we're dealing with science and we don't know how long it's going to take. If we had an idea, if the research that was done by the University of Minnesota, where viable neurons were obtained there, and it was reported in "Transplant Proceedings", Volume 26, Number 6, December of '94;
