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during World War II. He did not apologize. He was just saddened. I have been a Catholic all my life. I have been a strong pro-life advocate. I don't see that this is a pro-life issue, and I thought Senator Bohlke's speech was one of the most honest, candid speeches I've heard in my 12 years in this Legislature. As I said before, I'm a Catholic. I was raised by the nuns, and I believed every thing the Catholic church told me, and one of the things that I grew up learning was that...that women...girls shouldn't smoke, that the Blessed Virgin would blush with shame if she ever saw a woman walking down the street with a cigarette in her hand. And at the time, I was curious in nature so I wondered why St. Joseph wasn't blushing with shame when he saw a boy walking down the street. And we were also told that if a girl got pregnant, it was her fault. It was never the boy's fault because men had that instinct and women had to save those souls and, fortunately, none of my group ever got pregnant because we were going to go to Hell immediately and we didn't want to be responsible for boys going to Hell too. And I believed everything the Catholic church told me. And now, all of a sudden, all of a sudden, I'm...we didn't talk back to the nuns in those days anyway so I never really did get an answer for that. And then I'm reading all the stuff that the Catholic Voice is writing about me when I've been a good supporter all my life. And I'm wondering now, and I'm digressing a little here because I carry a lot of bills for the mentally ill, the people that can't speak for themselves and don't have the resources to speak for themselves, and when I was carrying one of the mental health bills, I asked Mr. Cunningham, why don't you support this, not knowing the philosophy of the true voice. And I asked him if he would, he said he had to get back to the Bishop, thought that was fine. He never responded. Finally, we wrote him several letters. I caught him outside as we were leaving the building and I said what about the mental health parity bill? You know biologic...mental...brain disorders are no different than physical disorders. And he said, oh, no, we don't lobby on issues like that. We don't support or oppose issues like that because they only support...they only work on abortion, euthanasia, I think that was the only two at the time. Now I see the bishops changed their minds and they are working on the death penalty also. So they don't...they are not interested in anything else but that. But I...that's all right, I accepted
