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of you all who want these mandates can buy the ethanol. I was told about a station operating now where this person I guess gets ethanol and regular unleaded from the same distributor. But at any rate, he's got to sell down that ethanol to a certain level. So what he does is put a sold out mask or hood over his regular so that people coming there have to buy ethanol if they want to gas up at that station. Now when you've got to do that, you have a product that cannot stand on its own merit. What we will not do is go to Senator Baker and say, Senator Baker, such and such a product is not selling so well for Albertson's so we're going to make you sell it or offer it for sale in your store. We're going to compel you to offer it for sale. How can a Legislature like the one in Nebraska seriously entertain a bill like this, and it would be entertaining except for the damage it will do to consumers. This is not going to help consumers. Senator Schrock and Governor Johanns thought of that idea of the environment as an afterthought. If he's really concerned about ground water, let's talk about pesticides, herbicides, and chemical fertilizers. They don't want to talk about that because they don't care about ground water. They care about fattening the pockets of a certain constituency. Why do they put corn and sorghum in the bill when corn and sorghum are not the only sources for ethanol? Because they're telling you this is to help the corn growers in Nebraska, but they don't want to pay their way. Well, let's say that you get this bill. Let's say that you compel these station people to either put in that other tank or go out of business, go out of business thanks to Senator Schrock and Governor Johanns or whatever you call him and the price of corn starts going up. Now Senator Jones is a rancher. He'll love it when the price of corn goes up because he feeds animals, and he'll get to pay more money for the corn and give Senator Schrock's constituency even more money. And those who make a business of feeding livestock are going to be deliriously happy because they've got to pay more now, not because of the marketplace seeking its level, but because the Legislature stepped in and in an artificial and inappropriate way is trying to manage the market. The urban senators certainly shouldn't fall for this, and I know the senators in the farther western areas of the state are not going to like it because that's not where ethanol is being burned, I find to my complete and utter shock and amazement. In corn country, they don't burn ethanol. And when you make ethanol, you use
