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petroleum-based fuel products; and you probably expend more fuel making ethanol than the amount of...or energy than the amount of energy that will be produced by ethanol. We're going to argue that stuff all day long. But there is one thing we need to keep in mind. This bill is designed to do one thing, not to protect the ground water. That has nothing to do with it. It's a stratagem to find a way to give more money into the pockets of corn interests. That's all that...and sorghum. It's not enough, young Senator Bourne, that they can make molasses with their sorghum. It's not enough that they can make popcorn. It's not enough that they can put corn in the can and sell it to me in the city. No, that's not enough. You know what this guy called Gekko said in his movie? Greed is good when you're on the receiving end of it, when you're receiving the benefits of the greed. And I'm not going to support this bill. And I'm going to see how many others will stand on the floor and oppose it or if I'm going to have to assume the onerous task of opposing it. I should have worn my terminator sweatshirt down here, "Senator A.R. Smith," but I didn't. I offered this motion because I could not sit still without unburdening my soul with reference to some of these issues on this terrible, atrocious bill. And there is a governor who pretends to be a conservative in favor of managing the market. But he's against doing anything about herbicides, pesticides, and chemical fertilizers. I'm sure that those who support this bill want to maintain the fertilizer tax so we can do something about trying to clean up the environment, but they don't. Greed, that's what we've got in play here today. Greed, compliments of Gekko. And I'm curious to see how many urban senators are going to support this bill. I say again, I can easily have access to gasoline without corn products in it. The only corn that I make use of is what's on my plate, brothers and sisters, and I consume my share of corn, Senator Smith. I probably eat more corn...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...than the people who produce it, and I recommend corn. I advocate corn. Corn is good in its place, on the table. And if ethanol is so good, let it stand on its own bucket bottom. Let it be sold to people who think that it's a better fuel. And if there is all this concern about the environment that we're suddenly told by those who support this
