mandate and Iowans don't want it so it was defeated. And Senator Schrock is talking about Iowa is going to pass one. A bill was defeated in South Dakota. So we keep being told these things. But what we will not have these purveyors of misinformation do is explain why ethanol cannot stand in the marketplace and make it on its own. Why must there be compulsion on merchants to sell it? If Senator Baker does not want to sell Wonderbread, why doesn't the state order him to do so? After all, Wonderbread might hire people, too. In terms of people with jobs, I think Senator Schrock tipped his hand. Cargill, those big shots are the ones pushing this. They want it. They're building plants. Now they've got to make people in Nebraska buy it. They probably get corn cheap. They might be responsible for the price of corn being so low and they're going to gouge the consumer. That's what ultimately is aimed at in this bill. But let's eliminate the consumer and talk about station operators. Are they not people, too? If we tickle a station operator, will he or she not laugh? If we prick a station operator with a pin, will he or she not bleed? And if he or she bleeds, will the blood not be red? They are people, too. They are citizens of this state. To focus on them for the benefit of Cargill, the other big operators, that one that David Brinkley went over to, that ADM and all those guys or a lot of them were under federal indictment. They're criminals, criminals, a criminal syndicate. And we are being asked to pressure the operators in this state for these big shot wheeler-dealers for a product that the public does not even want to buy. The public does not want to buy it. I haven't heard anybody tell me of a vehicle that will not burn unleaded regular gasoline. So when Senator Schrock talks about pulling up at a station and he can't buy corn fuel, he doesn't tell us, therefore, he cannot buy gasoline because his car will burn gasoline. What he wants to do is compel that person to put in another tank or go out of business because he doesn't really care about the station owners or operators. He cares about Cargill and these big shot corn producers. That's where his concern is. He's not concerned about ground water. Otherwise he'd be telling us again, I'm going to repeat it over and over, pesticides, herbicides...
