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did pass out a packet and in it there are a number of different things. One of the things that I spoke to some mechanic about ethanol products in your car because I had been assured by many supporters that, of course, it's no problem. And I know that my own mechanic had said, don't use it. Our former mechanic, who has now retired, had said, don't use it. But I thought, no, you know, I drive an older car. Maybe the new mechanics who are working on newer cars may have changed their mind about this new product because they're perhaps better informed. And on the third page of the handout that I gave you, we spoke with a gentleman here in Lincoln and we asked him what he thought of it. He said, I love it. It keeps me in business. And we went through a basic chemistry lesson about what the properties of alcohol are. Alcohol dries. Yes, it's cleaner, but, you know, so is Clorox. And I don't wash my face with Clorox. Why? Well, it would get it cleaner and it would kill the germs. And, in fact, we put it in water to purify water, and it has a wonderful clean smell; but it would be terribly hard on my skin. And I certainly think that what I was hearing from this mechanic is that when we want to take care of an engine and a fuel system in a car we want to lubricate it. You don't dry it out, you lubricate it. That means you need oil. So if you look at the conversation we had with him, he thought it was great for his business. That doesn't mean it's good for the consumer. I think that a mandate is always a bad idea. And if I had known Senator Schrock was going to do so much of my homework with owner's manuals, I wouldn't have spent as much time putting together this packet. But I would address the Chrysler New Yorker manual that does tell you that you could use this, but notice that these blends, due to their generally higher volatility, may adversely affect the starting, drivability, and fuel efficiency of your vehicle. If problems are experienced with ethanol gasoline blends, it is recommended that the vehicle be operated on gasoline. Now if you buy a product and you want to take good care of it so it will last a long time, and most people in Nebraska don't have the money to go out and replace everything every year, so they want it to last a long time, they're going to listen to their manufacturer and they're going to use the product that will ensure that it lasts a long time. And they're saying these are the problems that could occur. Now why would you want to make that choice? Some people may choose because they're willing to pay the price of the repairs in order
