damage the water as much as MTBE is. But I will tell you this. He said in that article the reason he didn't use ethanol, he says, because it's hotter burning. The fact of the matter is, ethanol is cooler burning higher octane gasoline so he got confused with the fact that it's a little more energy in the gasoline. Ethanol burns cooler. So I don't know how you combat all this misinformation. But show me where the damage is. It's not there. And I understand what mechanics have said for years and that's the reason a lot of farmers have been reluctant to use it. But I will tell you that when a farmer complains to me about the price of corn, I tell them, are you using ethanol. And if he isn't, I don't feel sorry for them. We have to use it. We're not only growing food in this country, I've been told all my life that we're going to run out of food. It's not going to happen. If there's any shortage of food, it's political. But I think we can produce fiber and I think we can produce fuel on our farms. And I don't want to import 55 percent of the fuel in this country. I don't think it makes much sense. OPEC has been in the news lately here. I'm sure ethanol doesn't make them shiver in their boots, but it's one thing we can do to help our self-reliance on our own domestic product. I think we need to take this step. I think we need to increase the consumption of ethanol in this state. Why don't people buy it? Well, one of the problems is the petroleum marketers who market this product don't necessarily price it fairly. Higher octane, let's charge more for it, never mind that it costs us less. I've seen it for 20 years, 3, 5 cents higher for ethanol even though they're paying 2 cents less at the wholesale level. Now that's greed, that's not pricing a product fairly. Yes, I'm concerned about the consumption of corn; 20 percent of the corn in the state of Nebraska is marketed through ethanol. We have a big plant in Blair and, Senator Chambers, you talked about Cargill. Well, who testified against the bill? BP Amoco with headquarters in London, England. You know, you make your comparisons, take your choice. I don't care. But we have a plant in Columbus, we have two plants in Hastings. We have one in York, we have one in Aurora, and we have one in Sutherland. Senator Dierks has people in his district talking about an ethanol plant. I have people in my district talking about an ethanol plant. For the record, I have never sold one bushel of corn to an ethanol plant. But I have been using it for 20-plus years, and to the best of my knowledge I've changed one or two
