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brought that subject up. Ethanol never seems to get too high. I think some of the ethanol plants lost some money during that time, during the time of \$5 corn and cheap oil. But right...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...at some point in time it becomes uncompetitive.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Dierks.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I'd like to ask Senator Schrock a question, please.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Schrock, would you respond.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.

SENATOR DIERKS: Senator Schrock, do you have any idea, have you heard anything or read anything in your research about the amount of oil we have left in this world to burn?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I had a...my legislative assistant attended a meeting in California, and California, which uses about one-third of the gasoline sold in this country, they're estimating that in 50 years we're going to be in dire trouble.

SENATOR DIERKS: I heard just a little bit ago that it was 40 years, no more oil, oil will be gone. We use it very fast. You know, I mean I sit at these stop signs here, stoplights, and watch the traffic go by and about 1 out of 20 cars will have two people in them, the rest of them just have one. So we use it like it's not going to go out of style, but it probably would. I will oppose the bracket motion. I think that the bill is something we really need to have before us. I think there's an opportunity here for those people on the farms of this country, this state who are producing corn, it provides them with another market. Senator...oh, Senator Schrock, can you give me another, answer another question for me?
