cars that go a lot longer than two years. In fact, I'm driving a 1990. And Senator Chambers I believe has the longevity record probably here in the Chamber on driving a Honda that had 440,000 miles I believe, and I don't recall what year it was. But we're talking about many, many people in our state who do keep cars for a long number of years. And when they do, I think that they are looking very carefully at what is best at the longevity record for their engine. Senator Schrock gave us a handout and it's the 2000 auto manufacturer fuel recommendations. And I think it's very interesting that on page 3 he has the Honda/Acura and it says with the ethanol product, if you notice any undesirable operating symptoms, try another service station or switch to another brand of gasoline. Fuel system damage or performance problems resulting from the use of an oxygenated fuel containing more than the percentages of oxygenates given above are not covered under warranty. One of the conversations which my husband had with the state troopers in the state of Minnesota was about ethanol products. He realized that they were using them. He wanted to know what the fuel economy was, if they had experienced any problems. The one thing that they were telling him was that there seems to be some kind of discrepancy in the actual fuel level of ethanol within the product. When you mix something, you don't always hit it right on the button. If you do a poll, you have a plus or minus error factor. And when you blend...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR REDFIELD: ...things, when you fill things, there are sometimes somewhat of a factor. And the one thing they told him is that they had noticed from their studies that there have been an error factor in the percentage of ethanol in the gasoline mixture that sometimes exceeded the amount that they gave. We're talking about a 10 percent mandate here? And if you look at all of these fuel manuals, they're saying a maximum, maximum 10 percent. If in fact that oxygen rating or the oxygenated additive exceeds 10 percent, we're here told that they are not covered under warranty. I think that that's another issue we need to talk about, and I have probably used up my time. I will push my light again. Thank you.
