SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members. I'd like to ask Senator Connealy a question or two if I could. First off, just...I apologize for this, but I noticed the phrase, "renewable fuel content equal to greater than three and one-half percent weight oxygen." What does that mean?

SENATOR CONNEALY: The oxygenated fuel would be about...that would equal ten percent ethanol and fuel.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. So people who know know that's what that means?

SENATOR CONNEALY: Right.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. Well, let me ask you another...

SENATOR CONNEALY: It's the same standard they're using for noncontainment areas and, as we go through places like Minneapolis where they were using MTBE earlier and they switched to ethanol, that replaced the three percent oxygen in gas.

SENATOR RAIKES: So this...that phrase comes to us from an air quality standard of some sort?

SENATOR CONNEALY: No, it comes through what we're using for oxygen in gas, but not necessarily air quality standards.
