follow the money. They are making 10 percent less money with every gallon of ethanol that's sold. Follow the money. Now in Nebraska, of course, you follow the money and you follow it to jobs for good Nebraskans. You follow it to economic development for the state of Nebraska. You follow it to being able to sell corn for farmers. This bill does the right thing. This amendment stops this bill. If big oil would price ethanol the way it ought to, a little bit cheaper than comparable gasoline without the ethanol blend, we wouldn't have to be here but they haven't done that. And they've had years and years to do it, and they haven't done it. I also wanted to mention about the environment. You know, I was sitting here thinking, 50 years from now when I'm still breathing the air, and I guarantee you I won't be in the Legislature, and the rest of you are in that great Legislature in the sky except for maybe Smith, he's pretty young, he might be around in 50 years, and Senator Chambers, it seems like he just keeps on going so he'll be, in 50 years he'll be 113, he'll probably still be serving here and harassing (laugh) future bills on ethanol. At that point, we'll be debating whether or not to use 100 percent alcohol fueled vehicles, whether or not to force retailers to sell 100 percent instead of this little 10 percent we're doing today. This is not...we don't have a major air quality problem in Nebraska today, but this is not a bill about today. This is a bill about future generations and this amendment does what the previous 15 amendments, I don't know how many we've talked about, the previous 15 amendments tried to do and it, essentially, guts the bill. If big oil would play ball and price it fairly, we wouldn't have to worry about this, but they haven't shown a willingness to do that in four years, and so I don't have a willingness to vote for the Chambers amendment. Thank you.
