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only offer no lead and then he offers road diesel and off-road diesel. He says, and I have two of them like that actually contacted me, but that's what the amendment does is substitute "gasoline" for "motor fuel", so if they have two or fewer storage tanks for gasoline, they would be exempt. And as it now reads, it would cover somebody with a 20 gallon tank that has kerosene in it or whatever. So it's a clarification of Senator Bromm's amendment and I would be glad to answer any questions, if there any. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Those wishing to speak on the Baker amendment, AM3154, Senators Janssen, Beutler, Schrock. Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback, and members of the Legislature. I understand what you're getting at, Senator Baker, and I think it's a good amendment because I never thought of that yesterday when we adopted Senator Bromm's amendment because you could have the diesel tank which would bring you up to three tanks, if you had two or less storage tanks and one was with...you had to have diesel in one of them, that would...that would...you would still have three tanks and you would have to offer the ethanol then, even though you only had one or maybe two of the other tanks. But this gives me an opportunity to talk a little bit. It doesn't particularly allude to the amendment but I guess it does, you know. I live 63 miles from Lincoln. You know, I drive down here in the mornings and go home in the evenings. You know, I love to watch...look at the countryside, and one thing and another, and, you know, I haven't seen...I haven't seen an oil well pumping in those 63 miles, but I sure do see a lot of cornfields. And if I lived in Texas and I lived 63 miles from the State Capitol there, I doubt very much whether I'd see any cornfields, but I probably would see a lot of oil wells. I don't know whether they sell ethanol in Texas or not, but if they do, I'll bet that they're...I bet that that ethanol is priced higher than the fossil fuel. That's something for you to think about. The state of Texas, I'm sure, and Oklahoma is watching out for their resources and the things that brings money into their state. I know we have some oil wells in Nebraska but there are darn few of them. I think Senator Matzke would probably have a better idea on how many...how many oil wells there are in Nebraska. But there's sure a heck of a lot
