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where we've negotiated, or we've discussed, and you've pretty much explained to me what drugs to use and what dosages and all that sort of thing, and I am administering the drugs myself. Now, that wouldn't affect that part of it, would it? For example, I would do the injections myself, and that aspect would not be impacted by this. Is that correct?

SENATOR DIERKS: That is correct.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. Now, suppose that the first several bottles of, say, Nuflor I bought from you, but as time goes on, I'm needing more and more of that, and I see an opportunity through a drug supply firm, whatever it might be, to buy that product at a lower cost. Would this impact that at all?

SENATOR DIERKS: Well, you'll have to answer something for me, Senator Raikes. I'm not familiar whether Nuflor is a prescription item only. If it is a prescription item only, then you would be affected. But anything that is over the counter, you can go to the S & S Store, the Country General, or Wal-Mart, or wherever you buy your medicine, you can use that like you always have. We're talking about prescription items, those items that have been declared by the Food and Drug Administration as needing a veterinarian's prescription before you can use it. That's what we're concerned about.

SENATOR RAIKES: Well, would it help if we changed the drug to Micotil? Do you know, is that one a prescription?

SENATOR DIERKS: I don't know.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay.

SENATOR DIERKS: Most of the antibiotics are not, but I really don't know.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. Anything that is, though, what you're telling me is that I would be restricted from getting a supply of that material from anyone other than a veterinarian?

SENATOR DIERKS: That's right. Let me say that I am familiar with the hormones, for instance. Any of the hormones that you
