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been around for a while. It is of a small amount, and there is a lot of support for this in Omaha among the neighborhood associations. Deer Park neighborhood, for example, is forced to raise money for the renovation of Deer Hollow Park. It's a city park, but yet the neighborhood association has to raise the money to renovate it if they want it done. And they're raising thousands of dollars on their own for that. And this might help them out, as well as other projects in Omaha, from Spring Lake Park, Dalman Area rehabilitation effort, and others who have worthy projects that they're trying to pursue. My final question, Senator Kiel. If...it says here, for no public purpose. If a neighborhood was forced to have to pay for the renovation of their city park, is that a public purpose, or could they buy playground equipment and so forth?

SENATOR KIEL: Where are you...

SENATOR HILGERT: I thought the...

SENATOR KIEL: ...what part of the...

SENATOR HILGERT: Let's see. I thought it was for public benefit...maybe I didn't read it in there.

SENATOR KIEL: To be eligible, the project has to be for a public benefit with a specific benefit to the neighborhood or community served.

SENATOR HILGERT: Yeah. I thought it had to be a new type of deal. And if an old park needed to be renovated, I was wondering if that would just be eligible or not.

SENATOR KIEL: That would be eligible.

SENATOR HILGERT: Okay. Well, great. I appreciate that, Senator Kiel. But with that, I would encourage the body to adopt this amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Hilgert. Senator Redfield on the Kiel amendment.
