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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes. Thank you, Madam President, members. Senator Kiel, would you answer a ques...where's the \$50,000 coming from, out of which fund?

SENATOR KIEL: Department of Economic Development.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: But you...it's coming out of the million or the \$250,000 in the A bill on this?

SENATOR KIEL: My understanding is, the million is in the Department of Agriculture, and that the \$250,000 is in the Department of Economic Development.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: So that's the microenterprise fund?

SENATOR KIEL: It's...let's see. To increase the funding available to the Microenterprise Development Partnership Program.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: So you're going to take...instead of \$250,000 going into the microenterprise, it would be \$200,000?

SENATOR KIEL: Yes. Instead of an increase of \$250,000, there would be an increase of \$200,000, and \$50,000 would go into this program.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Thank you. Well, that's another reason I oppose this amendment. I have here, if you want to look, in the last two years, where all the funding for the microenterprise funding. And I want you to know that I believe this bill is very fair, because we've added \$250,000 to the Microenterprise, which many have said is very successful, including Senator Hilgert. But I think you also need to know that Douglas County has gotten by far the most of the money in the Microenterprise Fund. Douglas County got \$210,152 out of the Microenterprise Fund, Lancaster County got \$63,755, and then every other one goes down to \$30,000, \$35,000, \$25,000. And Custer County got 71, a lot of counties got 1,000. My point is that this money...I think this bill is fairly distributing. Everyone is going to be eligible across the state in the bill itself. The Microenterprise, which was created two years ago, does cover most counties. But it, once again, is going heavily
