And I just...I think we have to defeat the Wickersham amendment and then we'll start this reform movement throughout all of government, because we've got to decide whether we're going to let the Governor have his picture on the map, we've got to decide whether we should prohibit anybody from hanging the sign where we welcome them to Nebraska. I, notwithstanding the senior member's reference to the fact that most officeholders are "Repelicans", you know, I can remember filling out my...my automobile tax statement, a well-known, long-time serving Democrat in Douglas County for most of my life. So I think...I think there might be the genesis of a great idea here. But, as we so often...maybe we should have an interim study, or maybe we could study it throughout the whole next biennium. I think we ought to proceed very carefully. This is far too revolutionary for this late night at this late date in this second half of the biennium. I think we ought to proceed with great care.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Chambers, on the Wickersham amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I could not agree with the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee more, we should proceed with great care, which translates for me the amount of care which a particular subject matter merits. And this merits no more care than is required in order to adopt Senator Wickersham's amendment. As for that sign that welcomes people to Nebraska, he probably feels it's his obligation to put his name up there.
