sections are changes that have occurred in this bill. Section 20, juvenile court judges may appoint CASA pursuant to law. In Section 27, a CASA organization shall screen, train, supervise CASA volunteers to advocate for the best interests of children when appointed by a court; hold case conferences with volunteers to review case progress and conduct annual performance reviews for all volunteers; provide staff and volunteers with written policies, practices, and procedures. One CASA program may serve more than one court. Section 28 is the program director of the CASA program shall be responsible for the administration of the program, including recruitment, selection, training, supervision, and evaluation of staff and CASA volunteers. In Section 29, CASA volunteers shall participate fully in preservice training, including instruction in recognizing child abuse and neglect, cultural awareness, socioeconomic issues, child development, the juvenile court process, permanency planning, volunteer roles and responsibilities, advocacy, information gathering, documentation, and observation of court proceedings prior to an appointment. All volunteers shall receive a training manual and a CASA program shall provide a minimum of ten hours of inservice training per year. Section 30 is the minimum qualifications for CASA volunteers are that they (1) be 21 years of age and have an interest in the welfare of children; be willing to commit one year of service; complete an application providing background information; and participate in a screening interview. The program director shall obtain the following information for a CASA volunteer: a criminal history record check; a check of the record with the state Abused or Neglected Child Registry; a driving record check; and at least three references who will attest to the applicant's character, judgment, and suitability. If the applicant has lived in Nebraska for less than 12 months, the program director shall obtain the records from all other jurisdictions where the applicant lived during the preceding year. Section 31 is a juvenile judge may appoint a CASA volunteer when in the opinion of the judge, in the opinion of the judge a CASA volunteer can provide a service required by the proceeding and the court finds the appointment is in the best interests of the child. The volunteer shall be appointed pursuant to a court order specifying the volunteer as either a co-guardian ad litem, if both a volunteer and an attorney are appointed as guardians ad litem; or a friend of the court acting
