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interjurisdictional planning commission is comprised of nine members representing the county and municipality. At least three but not more than six represent the county, not more than three members may be public officials. We thought it was very important to have public input. And you'll notice that if the registered voters bring such a petition to the county board and the city council and the county board and city council refuse to create this interjurisdictional planning commission, then the county board or then the court, the district court of the county can go ahead and establish that interjurisdictional planning commission. And this is not unlike our statutes in other areas. You'll notice then the interjurisdictional planning commission holds hearings, at least one prior to preparing a plan for merger, and studies the local subdivision and so forth. The plan is then submitted back to the county board and city council or village board for approval. If the process was done by joint resolution, the governing bodies must approve the plan before it is submitted for voter approval. If the process was begun by petition, the governing bodies may approve the plan; but if they do not, the plan still proceeds to a vote of approval by the people and then the registered voters in the affected areas approve or disapprove this plan. Now that's the main guts of the committee amendment. We did change a couple of things. We made the municipal county's governing board, we made it so that there would be more elected by district than there would be elected by large. That's another part of the committee amendment. And then we also, at the insistence of one of our members at least, decided that there ought to be a process for unmerging or dissolution of this municipal county. So basically we set up a process that would be very similar to the original merger process, but it would be for the purpose of dissolution. With that, Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the body for the time and I think that Senator Wickersham will finish up with the Revenue Committee's amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Wickersham, you have about seven minutes.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Thank you, Mr. President. I don't know that it's necessary to continue a discussion of the Revenue Committee amendment. I think I have set out most of the provisions. One that I would call to your attention is that the
