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Senator Wehrbein?

SENATOR BROWN: Yes, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't have any comment at this point. I was going to speak on my own. Now I'm tongue-tied.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Let's see, Senator Chambers then. Senator Brown, do you want the balance of your time back? You waive it? Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Schimek a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Schimek.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schimek,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I've been trying to get caught up on this bill. There will be one member from...an enrolled member from an Indian tribe on this commission?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: The original bill called for two enrolled members of tribes in Nebraska, and the committee felt pretty strongly that one of those persons should be the head of the Indian Commission, so that would be an automatic kind of appointment and the other person then would be appointed by the Governor.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you. Members of the Legislature, before I get into what I'm going to say, because I must be true to my school too, I have here a quarter-pound proof of the gold dollar with Sacagawea's image on it. It's nine hundred ninety-nine hundredths pure silver with genuine twenty-four carat gold, three and a half inches in diameter. The design adaptation of the new United States dollar coin, featuring portrait of Sacagawea, reverse is the American eagle. They minted 100,000 of them. The number of this one is 85,155.
