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750 at Vickers. So I understand the frustration, but the answer, frankly, is...is that there are cutoff lines and this is a line to be drawn. I would also ask them to respond to the better angels of thy nature. Extend yourself. And I'm not sure it would help the frustration of the working people that you referenced to, it doesn't really truly help them putting the real poor through a tighter wringer. Does that make them really feel better? I really don't think so. So what we have to do is pursue what they're talking about, help them where we can. This is just one part of the pie. This is one piece of the puzzle.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Hilgert. I think that was a very good answer and I appreciate it very much. And I think that...that you're right, there are cutoffs. I guess I would just rhetorically ask if there is something else we should do for those very limited income people who have to work and who can't stay home with their children, if they are getting as much of a tax credit as they should? They should certainly be getting more, and they are proportionally because there's graduated income tax, but are we...are we really treating them equitably in terms of the overall fairness here? I think that higher income people it's not a problem from...for. I'm not even sure they need the tax...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...credit, but we've always, I think, given it just to everybody. So, with that, I would simply thank Senator Hilgert for his response.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Chambers, on the Hilgert amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, what this amendment that Senator Hilgert is offering us proves is that we should never throw anybody away. No matter how unwise or ill-advised something may be that they offer at one point, we should review on its merits whatever may be offered after that. And as far as I'm concerned, this amendment that Senator Hilgert is offering is something like an eraser. It doesn't erase everything. Erases quite a bit, and it shows that there might be something of value still in the young
