So those are just a few comments that I have as I sit here and listen to the debate and I'm hoping that we can get more input as we go along to determine, in fact, if we don't...if this does not get the required number of votes, where are we going to go from there? And so I'm going to sit back and listen, and the way it sets right now I don't think I can support the override motion. But I'm willing to sit and listen. With that, Mr. Speaker, thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Suttle.

SENATOR SUTTLE: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I think that we have set our priorities in this body. I think we want to give property tax relief, even though property taxes are not in the state's bailiwick of responsibilities. We have decided to give TV stations sales tax relief, and we've decided to give certain people relief from having to pay their taxes. Therefore, our projected revenues that are come in...coming in are not as high. What we have to decide now is, even though we have given all this tax relief, will we still have enough sales and income tax coming into the state to be able to pay for what we want to pay for. Mental health in this state is a mess. We're in crisis. This body loves to crisis manage. So, oh, if we're in a crisis now, so it's time to start managing. We have got to override this veto, not only for Region VI, which...this is "get Omaha" session, I do believe, so let's...let's not override Region VI or the mental health problems. Let's all just put them in jail and forget about them. I really think that it would not be wise of us to do that. Putting mentally ill people in jail is not the way you treat the mentally ill. These people are ill. They are not criminals, and they can't just snap out of it. This is a brain disease. This isn't a disease where they can decide one day, well, I guess I won't be mentally ill anymore, I guess I'll get better and be a productive citizen. May I ask Senator Crosby a question, Mr. Speaker?
