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\$30 million that will go out in additional aid to community colleges, \$25 million dollars that will be used to produce a credit on individuals' property tax statements.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So taken together it makes \$55 million...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Now there, well, you know...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...aiming towards property tax relief.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes. But Senator, there are also increases in other expenditures that might produce property tax relief. For example, state aid to schools, while it declined...well, no, that actually declined as an absolute number, I'm sorry.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, well, let...let me take one little piece at a time. If we had not given that \$25 million for people to get 15 or 20 dollars back on their, when they file their property tax statement, or however they're going to get it back, if they want it back even, we would have that \$25 million available for other purposes at this point, is that true?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you all thought, in your wisdom, that it would be better to go ahead and fritter away \$25 million to be where we are today, more or less.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Well, Senator, I don't want to take a lot of your time but there is also a distinction to be made between a one-time expenditure and an ongoing expenditure. It is the ongoing expenditures that will cause us problems in the fourth year of our planning, and if you can have some one-time expenditures to take cash off the table and remove people's appetites for ongoing spending, then you've accomplished something that is probably very prudent and good.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wickersham, to whom is tomorrow promised?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Excuse me.
