this year helps spread out the cost, helps keep the trust fund in a solvent status until we can look at it again next year. But that ongoing cost is probably going to be there one way or another unless you just intend permanently to punish the university because, I don't know, because they didn't come in soon enough, or...why is it that we want to punish them? For some other reason, maybe. But what I'm saying to you is if you want to...if you want to not override any vetoes and just stick to one version of what the revenue projection is, and that's...and that's the most pessimistic one, then you shouldn't be overriding anything. You shouldn't be overriding provider rates. You shouldn't be overriding any of it because you may not...you're not...probably not going to get to a zero figure anyway. So it seems to me that the package is a reasonable...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...combination of suggestions, and I would just ask you to think about that. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members, and thank you, Senator Beutler, that was one of the things that I was going to mention, that the \$500,000 for Centennial Mall is only one-time and also that the Sheldon money does not go into the base. But I wanted to clear one other thing up, Senator Suttle, about 309 money; 309 money goes to repair the outside of buildings, and UNL does, they have made 309, I mean, Sheldon as their top priority for whatever 309 would be available, and they have gotten some. But 309 could not pay for what we're talking about because it's equipment. So I wanted...I wanted to be sure because I hadn't made that clear earlier. The other thing, the Centennial Mall and the Sheldon money is 1.4, it's the lower part of this particular package, this override. It is not the top part of it, and I think Senator Beutler made that clear. But I want to talk about the health insurance for the university, and the money for the providers, and the reason I want to bring those two up on this last time that I can speak on this...in this particular go-around, we're talking about people here. Put aside the fact that you might think the administration should have done something, didn't do something,
