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Fund. But the Cash Reserve Fund exists to be a dynamic that allows us to have the flexibility to do things when we need to, and it, you know, it is not something in and of itself that we put a certain amount in and say, oh great, we've got that amount of money there. It exists for us to be able to use when it's appropriate and it is a dynamic that goes from a healthy amount to a less than healthy amount and fluctuates based on the dynamics of what we do and our needs. And...and so I hate to see us be wed to an amount in there being some sort of an absolute, because it really isn't. It is just a mechanism that allows us to have flexibility here on the floor. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Further debate on the motion to override? Seeing none, Senator Crosby, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just withdraw the amendment (sic--motion). Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: It is withdrawn. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion, Senator Crosby, I have a motion from you with respect to improvements to Centennial Mall.

SENATOR CROSBY: I withdraw that one, please.

CLERK: Senator Crosby, then I have a motion with respect to Sheldon.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion, Senator Jensen would move to override the Governor's line-item veto with respect to the mental health provider rates, I believe.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Jensen, you're recognized to open on your motion to override.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I have never brought forth a motion, in my six years, to override a Governor's veto, and in my six years I've only voted to override one Governor's veto and that happened to be for a building down in Beatrice that the previous
