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can take care of these kids and other folks who have behavioral problems and the rest. Why this...why is this so important? Well, I'll tell you it's important because we don't seem to worry about how much it costs when we don't have enough of these kind of programs and these kind of beds around when we build new jails. And, at the other end, we should in fact have decent facilities once they're incarcerated so they're taken care of. But most of the time these kids are in the programs, as provided in these \$2 million part of the override, because the judges sentence them there. In some cases they're privately assigned. But in every case we got a program in the state that provides an alternative to the judges and everybody else so they don't have to go out of state and where we don't have to spend twice the state money we're spending to take care of the kids and where they're not, I don't think, in my opinion, given the kind of chance they are at the Omaha Home for Boys and Uta Halees and the rest. Well, this is vital. This is important. They haven't had a raise, Senator Jensen, God bless him, knows this, for the last six years, so this is not a partisan issue. Please, all of you understand that. This isn't a Governor Johanns issue. This is a Governor Nelson and a Governor Johanns issue, or...where is the...is the other Governor out there that's going around talking to everybody? I'd look to see if our other Governor was out there. But, in any case, this is so important to us all. You know, we...we want to make sure, we want to make sure when we ask people to privately invest in this kind of a program that we do our share, that's all. And some of you may have been told that there was an increase to some of these people because OPTIONS got an increase. Well, OPTIONS is a program from out of state somewhere that got all the increases and have continued to get all the increases they requested through the department that manages those things for them and with them. And then the people that get that \$192 a day, like OPTIONS, when they have somebody they can't handle, where do they...where do you think they send them? Oh, they send them to Uta Halee and they send them to Omaha Home for Boys, Cooper Farm (sic--Village), and they send them to North Platte. They send them all over because they can't handle them. They get the \$192 and they shift some of that cost back to the people that take the kids that need these...the kind of help that those kind of behavioral programs provide, but then once those kids are gone everybody else still gets a lesser amount of money. It's
