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\$1,500,000. So I think it's time that, given the discussion we've had on the fiscal status, that we begin to look at those numbers and I think you need to be reminded that this is a fairly significant financial impact. With that, thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Raikes. Senator Matzke, on the Baker amendment.

SENATOR MATZKE: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Senator Raikes, to respond to your inquiry, the investment credit is 10 percent. So if the investment drops the credit would drop, would be 10 percent of whatever the investment is. And so far as...actually, telemarketing is not listed in the bill as one of the qualified businesses. The closest, and I'll read...I'll read one of the paragraphs under the definition of qualified business. It includes the performance of data processing, telecommunications, insurance, or financial services. And then it goes on to some other definition. It doesn't list telemarketing. It lists telecommunications. Now, I suppose that could fall within the...the purview of telecommunications, but it isn't specifically identified as one of the businesses, although we understand that there is a business in one of the southeast Nebraska communities that is looking towards setting up a telecommunications firm that would market agricultural commodities and probably employ 10 to 15 people. So I don't know that you would necessarily call that telemarketing. It would be telecommunications, though. So far as the cost of the bill is concerned, you're correct on the fiscal note. The first year includes an additional sum for equipment. It...the fiscal note says the agency notes that there's a one-time data processing cost of \$69,000 for the first year and that does not then continue. The fiscal impact, of course, depends on how successful the bill is. If it does induce and create and provide an incentive for increased employment then, of course, the state would receive additional income tax from both the employees and the business, and of course the credits would be larger. We hope it's successful so that, frankly, so that we have to pay...we'll have to reduce a lot of credits or (inaudible) tax by a lot of credits. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Matzke. Senator Baker,
