at which mothers can stay home with their children also needs amended on Select File if we advance the bill, although presumably if he had that amendment prepared he could yet bring that on General File. There are other issues with LB 925 that Senator Landis left out of his litany. One of them is an amendment that he has filed dealing with the pass-through of the credits or the benefits that are to be granted if the bill passes. The pass-throughs have to extend to members of S corporations or shareholders of S corporations, more precise terminology, members of limited liability companies, beneficiaries of trusts, for example, and those have been...he has a suggested amendment in that regard and that suggestion is somewhat wanting, Senator, but we may be able to fix that. The...I would also suggest that there are other items that need to be repaired in the bill. Senator Raikes had a pending amendment which he withdrew, as I recall, so that we could take a vote on the motion to strip out everything except the modification of...of the stay home time for mothers. That amendment needs to be considered. That's probably in the rubble...in the ballpark of what Senator Landis would consider to be quality aspects of the plan. I think it would also be important to add an amendment, quite frankly, that said that the program that we're instituting did not apply to any preexisting child-care program from a business. Why should we "incent" something that already exists? And I was quite intrigued in that regard actually because I get a publication, if you can believe this, from the Omaha Chamber of Commerce. I think it's very kind of them to send that to me. It's called Profile. I don't know if you get that in your office or not, but if you got the latest edition of Profile, look on the second page. There's a very nice article about a very large financial institution in that town that is, by golly, going to institute a child development center in their business without any help from us. Wonderful. It's what they should do and, in fact, in the article it's what they acknowledge that they thought that they should do for the good of their business and the good of their employees. But they're, by golly, going to do it without any help from us.
