reimbursement (inaudible). So, for clarity, we thought it would be good to separate that. Secondly, we decided that office expenses need not be reported in quarterly filings. One of the things that came out at the committee hearing is that one of the lobbyists put \$124,000 worth of office expenses into...into miscellaneous, the miscellaneous category, and it looked as if that money was being, again, spent to entertain or whatever senators, so we thought let's make that clear. Then finally on that same page, we said that only aggregate amounts would be...that were spent on officials would be reported under entertainment, including expenses for food and drink. We wouldn't expect people to do that by senator. If you go over to the second page, we added a part that said that admissions to state-owned facilities or state-regulated industries are reportable as a lobbying expense. These are football tickets. In plain language, these are football tickets and they would be reportable. They would also be tickets to the Lied Center and different kinds of activities like that. The second item on that page said that...it says that the total amount expended on gifts is reportable and, finally, the exceptions to the definition of a gift are eliminated. For example, anything of value which is given is considered a gift. However, gifts of food and drink for immediate consumption and admission to state-owned facilities or state-regulated industries or events are permissible regardless of value. And, finally, there is a new gift report that says lobbyists and principals have to file a report with the Clerk indicating the name of the gift recipient, a description of the gift, and the gift's value. That's it in a nutshell. The amendment, AM3201, would actually replace the committee amendments, and I...and I know that that might be somewhat confusing for you, but just bear with and see if you don't think that the AM3201 would be a better option. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

CLERK: Mr. President, the first amendment to the committee amendments is by Senator Coordsen, but I have a note from Senator Coordsen that he would withdraw and offer, as a substitute, AM3201, which is a Wickersham-Schimek amendment, AM3201, Mr. President.
